Kristin Hausler (lic. iur. University of Fribourg, LL.M. University of British Columbia) is the Dorset Senior Fellow in Public International Law at the British Institute of International and Comparative Law, in London, and a Principal Investigator on the HEURIGHT project. Kristin is also a consultant for Geneva Call on a study which seeks to promote the respect of cultural heritage by armed non-state actors, for which she has conducted training on the heritage protection in armed conflict.

She regularly lectures on human rights and cultural heritage matters and was an elected member of the Cultural Heritage Committee of the International Law Association. Kristin has a background in the cultural sector, having worked in museums and studied modern and contemporary art at Christie in New York. She also worked at the Museum of Anthropology in Vancouver on the Journey Home, a field project developed with Indigenous peoples, which focused on the return of Ancestral remains to their native communities.
