Industry has intensively shaped the European identity. With the European Steel and Coal Community - the Schuman Declaration - it has even marked the birth of the united Europe we live in today.

In many (peri-)urban regions, industry continues to be the most important employer, as such touching everyday life in several ways (jobs, education, society, ...). Currently, the industrial setting is changing substantially again – some of the driving forces often being summed up as industry 4.0 – and with it, communities and culture in industrial regions.

In that way, Industrial Culture addresses as well current EU policies of smart specialisation, the reindustrialisation of Europe and the importance of cultural identity in Europe.

It needs however the relevant stakeholders, foremost policy makers, companies, industrial museums, tourist boards and educational institutions, to give Industrial Culture a strong voice in Europe – on local, regional, national and European levels.
